# 1.3 Note installation guidelines

The module complies with the requirements if you

- 1. comply with the installation guidelines described in the User Manual when installing and operating the module.
- 2. also follow the rules below on installation of the equipment and on working on switch cabinets.

# 1.4 Installation of the unit

Modules must be installed in electrical equipment rooms/areas or in enclosed housings (e.g. switch boxes made of metal or plastic). Moreover, you must earth the unit and the switch box (metal box) or at least the top-hat rail (plastic box) onto which the module has been snapped.

# 1.5 Working on switch cabinets

In order to protect the modules against static electrical discharge, the personnel must discharge themselves electrostatically before opening switch cabinets or switch boxes.

# 2 Information for the machine manufacturers

# 2.1 Introduction

The UNIGATE® module does not constitute a machine as defined by the EU "Machinery" Directive. Consequently, the module does not have a Declaration of Conformity in relation to the EU Machinery Directive.

# 2.2 EU Machinery Directive

The EU Machinery Directive stipulates the requirements applicable to a machine. The term "machine" is taken to mean a totality of connected parts or fixtures (see also EN 292-1, Paragraph 3.1)

The module is a part of the electrical equipment of the machine and must thus be included by the machine manufacturer in the Declaration of Conformity process.

# 3 Introduction

The UNIGATE® CX-CANopen (Mapping) - PROFIBUS DP module serves to adapt a CANopen interface to PROFIBUS according to EN 50 170. In this application it acts as a gateway and works as a CANopen with master functionality on one side and as a PROFIBUS DP slave on the other side. It can be operated by any standard-compliant PROFIBUS master.

The module CX-C4Map-PB essentially consists of the following hardware components:

- Electrically isolated RS485 interface to the PROFIBUS DP
- PROFIBUS ASIC
- Microprocessor 89C51RD2
- RAM and EPROM
- Serial interfaces RS232 (Service interfaces)
- Electrically isolated interface to CANopen
- Debug interfaces (for device configuration)

# Conceptual



C4Map stands for CANopen with CANopen (mapping) functionality.



In the further course of this manual, the term "Fieldbus" is frequently used. In these cases this applies to the PROFIBUS DP interface.

# 4 Operation modes of the Gateway

#### 4.1 Run mode

When delivered, the UNIGATE® CX is in RUN mode. The following functions can be used in RUN mode:

- Data exchange
- Device configuration
- Debug mode

# 4.2 Data exchange mode

In data exchange mode, the data is transmitted bidirectionally between the two respective fieldbus systems. The data exchange mode is only active if neither the device configuration nor the debug mode is used.

# 4.3 Device configuration

In RUN mode it is possible to configure the device. The configuration is done with the configuration software WINGATE via the DEBUG interfaces of the device. The DEBUG Interfaces are RS232 interfaces. They are located on X1 and X2 on pin 2 (0V Pwr) + pin 3 (Rx debug) + pin 4 (Tx debug).

**Note:** Pin 2 (0V Pwr) is also the 0V power supply for the device. In addition, the two rotary switches S4 and S5 must be set to the "0" position. The menu items "Extras" -> "Upload\_Config\_Debug" or "Download\_Config\_Debug" are used to read and write the configuration in WINGATE. The exact procedure for device configuration is described in the WINGATE manual in the chapters "Connection UNIGATE® via the debug interface" and "Configuration via the debug interface".

# 4.4 Debug mode

In RUN mode, it is possible to execute a script that is programmed with the Software Protocol Developer step by step. Debugging is done with the Software Protocol Developer via the debug interfaces of the device. The debug interfaces are RS232 interfaces. The debug interfaces are located on X1 and X2 on pin 2 (0V Pwr) + pin 3 (Rx debug) + pin 4 (Tx debug). Note: Pin 2 (0V Pwr) is also the 0V power supply for the device. In addition, the two rotary switches S4 and S5 must be set to the "0" position.

**Attention:** This is only necessary for the development of a script. For more information, please refer to the online help of the Protocol Developer.

# 5 The Debug-interface

# 5.1 Overview of the Debug-interface

The UNIGATE® features a Debug-interface, that allows a step-by-step processing of a Script. Normally this interface is only required for the development of a Script.

# 5.2 Starting in the Debug-mode

When applying power to the UNIGATE® (power up) the firmware will output the binary character 0 (0x00) after a self-test was carried out on this interface. If the UNIGATE® receives an acknowledgement via this interface within 500 ms, it is in the Debug-mode. The acknowledgement is the ASCII-character O (0x4F).

With the start in the Debug-mode the further execution of Script commands will be put to a stop.

# 5.3 Communication parameter for the Debug-interface

The Debug-interface is always operating with 9600 baud, no parity, 8 data bit, 1 stop bit. It is not possible to change this parameter in the Protocol Developer. Please consider the fact that these settings have to be in accordance with those of the PC-COM-interface and that the flow control (protocol) has to be set on "none" there.

# 5.4 Possibilities with the Debug-interface

Usually the Protocol Developer is connected to the Debug-interface. With it a step-by-step processing of a Script, monitoring jumps and decisions and looking at memory areas is possible. Moreover breakpoints can be set. It basically possesses all characteristics a software-development tool is typically supposed to have. However, it is also possible to carry out a Scrip-update via this interface.

From Script version [27] on you can also output data with the Script command "SerialOutputToDebugInterface". Please also pay attention to the remark in the manual 'Protocol Developer'.

# 5.5 Commands of the Debug-interface

The commands for the use of the Debug-interface are described in the instruction manual Protocol Developer.

# 6 Mode of operation of the system

# 6.1 General explanation

Communication can be split into seven layers, Layer 1 to Layer 7, in accordance with the ISO/OSI model.

The Deutschmann Automation Gateways convert Layers 1 and 2 of the customized bus system (RS485 / RS232 / RS422) to the corresponding Fieldbus system. Layers 3 to 6 are blank, and Layer 7 is converted in accordance with chapter 24.3.

#### 6.2 Interfaces

The Gateway features a CANopen and fieldbus interface as well as the serial interfaces RS232-, RS422- and RS485.

# 6.3 Data exchange

All data is transferred by the Gateway in dependence of the downloaded Script.

# 6.4 Possible data lengths

# 6.5 Startup phase

The Gateway is parameterized and configured by the Master during the startup phase. Only after a correct termination of the startup phase the data exchage with external devices will take place.

# 7 Implemented protocols in UNIGATE® CX C4Map

The protocols "CANopen (mapping)" and "Delta exchange" are required for communication.

# 7.1 Implemented protocols at CANopen interface

**CANopen Mapping** 




Note: Data exchange is only possible when the PROFIBUS is in "Data Exchange".

# **Data structure**



The mapping in the gateway can be configured using the supplied WINGATE<sup>®</sup> software. This gateway module from the UNIGATE series from Deutschmann Automation allows a coupling between **fieldbus** and **CANopen**<sup>®</sup>.

The gateway behaves on the CANopen<sup>®</sup> side as a standard-compliant master and on the PRO-FIBUS DP side as a standard-compliant slave, so the recurring problem of connecting CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave participants to a Siemens PLC with PROFIBUS DP is solved.

# Data exchange

The data exchange between fieldbus and CANopen<sup>®</sup> is carried out by the mapping that is configured with "WINGATE<sup>®</sup>".

Mapping is the mapping of data from a fieldbus to any other fieldbus. All data provided by the corresponding buses can serve as data here.

The mapping works in both directions, i.e. both from master to slave and vice versa.

#### **Example:**


For example, it can be specified that the 2nd byte of the COB-ID201 (CANopen® node) is transferred as the 7th byte in the fieldbus data.

256 mappings are currently possible (128 Tx and 128 Rx mappings). The data is transferred as PDOs. A maximum of 16 Tx and 16 RX PDOs can be set. Each PDO can have up to 8 bytes (i.e. 8 mappings). 16 PDO \* 8 bytes = 128 mappings. SDO access is also supported (see chapter 7.1.2.10).

#### 7.1.2.1 Configuration of the mapping

To create or edit such a mapping, connect the UNIGATE® in configuration mode (see chapter 4.1) to the PC via the RS232 interface and start the "WINGATE®" software there.

After starting the software, an upload from the connected device is carried out automatically. The relevant parameters for this device are shown. Double-click the "map ..." value. After a short time a dialog is displayed with which you can edit all map entries of the gateway, similar to the following image:



You can now change the mappings, delete them or add new ones (right mouse button).

Alternatively, the values can also be entered in the table on the right.

The entry must be confirmed with "Apply", only then are the values accepted.

Then you only have to download the data to the gateway (Menu Extras\Write configuration via debug interface) and the UNIGATE® works with the new configuration.




It is permitted to map the same byte of a PDO several times to different positions in the fieldbus.

However, a maximum of 8 mappings can be entered per PDO!



When mapping from fieldbus to CANopen<sup>®</sup>, several mappings can be configured for each fieldbus byte. The total number of these multiple mappings must not exceed 31.



Only COB-IDs from the range 101H..580H can be used for the PDO mappings (see DS301 specification for CANopen®).


#### 7.1.2.2 Node Guarding

If a CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave is monitored via node guarding, the CANopen<sup>®</sup> master cyclically receives the node guard request to respond to the request. The slave in turn replies to this node guarding request with the corresponding response. Both master and slave can monitor each other in this way.

If the slave does not receive a node guard request, it will assume that the bus connection has been interrupted or that the master has failed.

#### **Settings**

The default for all slaves is that no node guarding is carried out. If node guarding is to be activated for a slave, an entry "enable node guarding" must be added to the current configuration in WINGATE for each slave. The parameters "node ID", "guarding time" and "life time factor" must be determined in each entry.


#### Settings for node guarding

The parameter node ID specifies the ID of the CANopen<sup>®</sup> node on which monitoring is to take place. The guarding time is the interval in milliseconds in which the master requests the slave to send its guarding response.

The Life Time Factor tells how many times the slave's response may fail to appear before the master assumes that the slave has failed.

#### 7.1.2.3 Display of the node guarding states

Node guard mapping is used to display the node guard states of the individual slaves to the fieldbus. 8 slaves are always represented in one byte; So exactly one bit of information is reserved for a slave. This information can be displayed anywhere in the fieldbus data of the gateway, i.e. it is shown in the input area of the fieldbus master for this gateway.



Display of the node guarding information

#### Distribution of the bits for nodes 1-8:

If no node guard is activated for a slave, the slave has failed or no node guarding information has been exchanged, the corresponding bit for this slave is 0. The bit is 1 if node guarding was activated for this slave and the slave for the node Guarding requests answered in the appropriate time.


Example: Node guarding is activated for nodes 1 and 2. Slave 1 does not respond to node guarding, slave ID 2 works normally. A mapping of the information in the fieldbus is entered in the 2nd byte.

#### 7.1.2.4 Emergency Messages

The gateway can receive up to 10 emergency messages from all slaves for which node guarding has been activated and writes them to a queue. At the same time, an internal counter is increased that contains the number of EMCY messages received. Both the data of the current message and the number of EMCY messages received and the Node ID of the sender of the message can be displayed in the fieldbus output data of the gateway. The next message can be called up via the control byte. If the data of the EMCY message are shown in the bus data, the new data is already visible in the fieldbus when the data is toggled.



Setting the emergency messages

#### 7.1.2.5 Gateway Control Byte

Some properties of the gateway can be controlled by fieldbus data. For this purpose, the information must be transferred from the fieldbus to the gateway, i.e. it must be in the gateway's entrance area. The data can only be evaluated by the gateway if this information is mapped from the fieldbus to the gateway.

#### 7.1.2.6 Bit 7 (MSB): EMCY Toggle Bit

With this bit, the next EMCY message can be transferred to the current data buffer, regardless of whether the data is displayed in the fieldbus or not. The counter is decremented by 1 if it is not 0.

#### 7.1.2.7 Bit 6: Set Operational Toggle Bit

If this bit is changed, the gateway sends the Set Operational message to the slaves. This feature is to be used when some slaves are slower than the master and are only ready when the master has already sent this message.


# 7.1.2.8 Bit 5: RTR - Request to response

With this bit (transition from 0 -> 1) RTR telegrams can be sent to all PDOs mapped as Rx. This RTR means that the addressed PDOs are sent and thus updated in the gateway.

If the RTR functionality is used, at least 1 Rx PDO must be mapped. Furthermore, no more than 50 Rx PDOs may be mapped, otherwise an overrun will occur.

## 7.1.2.9 Gateway Error Byte

The current error status of the gateway itself, like the other values of the node guarding or the slave data, can be mapped in the fieldbus.

#### 7.1.2.10 SDO Obj Mapping


SDO transmission via a "window" in the fieldbus (FB). The following fixed data record structure is used in the FB, which is mapped into the FB data from the FB index. A distinction is made between:

FB-ldx (In) = data from the FB master (PLC) to the UNIGATE FB-ldx (Out) = data on the FB master (PLC) from the UNIGATE


The user must ensure that enough space is reserved in the FB data for the longest data record. SDO transmission is always initiated by the FB master and is ended when the job number in the FB output data is identical to the job number in the FB input data.

#### Please note

The counting starts with index "0" = 1st byte, i. H. in our example the "8" corresponds to the 9th byte!

We want to query the manufacturer hardware version of a connected CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave (object index 1009h). The CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave has the node ID = 5.

Data-Len Request should be chosen as large as the maximum expected receive data length! Otherwise, the data remaining according to the set length will be capped.

If the Data-Len request is equal to or greater than the received data length, the actual data length is returned as the Data-Len response.

#### 7.1.2.11 Slave Mode

The slave mode can be activated via WINGATE. If the slave mode is "enabled", only the start sequence of the master function is not transmitted. It is not a standard-compliant CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave and no EDS file is supplied.

#### 7.1.2.12 CAN Fieldbus address

Via WINGATE the CAN fieldbus address can e.g. can be set for slave mode. This is only active when the dip switch on the front of the device is in position "0"




# 7.1.2.13 Communication cycle period (object 1006h)

This object provides the communication cycle time. This period defines the SYNC interval.

The function can be permanently activated via the Sync. Time (ms) Obj 1006h can be activated or set with WINGATE or temporarily via third-party engineering software.

With WINGATE you can use the Sync. Time (ms) Obj 1006h a time can be set in milliseconds (ms). With the value "0" the function is inactive.



#### 7.1.2.14 Start phase

The UNIGATE® sends the NMT command "BusStart" every 2 seconds during the start phase; i.e. all connected CANopen® slaves are set to the "Operational" state.

As soon as the UNIGATE<sup>®</sup> has received the first PDO that is present in the mapping, this start phase is exited; i.e. the NMT command is no longer sent.

There is no timeout here because the CANopen<sup>®</sup> slaves do not have to react to this NMT command.

If a CANopen<sup>®</sup> slave is later connected to the network, it no longer receives this NMT command. However, it can be triggered again at any time via the FB command byte (bit 6) in order to also set later CANopen<sup>®</sup> slaves to the "Operational" state.

#### 7.1.2.15 Data throughput time

Processing times of the data through the gateway:

The actual throughput time of the data from CANopen<sup>®</sup> to the fieldbus or vice versa depends, among other things, on the following parameters:

- Number of mappings
- Length of the configured PROFIBUS data
- Number of COB IDs used in the mappings
- Number of changed PROFIBUS data between 2 transmissions
- Number of bytes mapped in a COB ID
- Baud rate in PROFIBUS or CAN

Due to these many parameters and the interdependencies of the parameters, no calculation formula for the lead time can be specified. From practical measurements, lead times from 10 ms to 100 ms were observed, the maximum time being measured with a PB configuration of 244 bytes I / O and 488 mappings.

In practice, under "normal" conditions, a lead time of a few milliseconds can be expected. To optimize the lead time, the following guidelines should be followed:

- Number of mappings as small as possible
- Length of the fieldbus configuration as short as possible
- Use all 8 bytes in the COB-IDs if possible => use as few COB-IDs as possible

# 7.2 Implemented Protocols - PROFIBUS DP

In addition to the "Delta exchange" protocol, the universal script also contains other protocols. However, these cannot be used for communication with the "CANopen (Mapping)" protocol.

# 7.2.1 Protocol Delta exchange

The Delta exchange protocol can only be used from version 1.9.0 of the universal script Deutschmann.

With this protocol, data can be specifically copied to an area on the fieldbus output side, i.e. from the UNIGATE® to the PLC.

To do this, two control parameters, the address offset and the number of bytes, are required at the start of the transfer before the actual user data then follows. First comes the address offset (Word), then the number of bytes (Word), then the user data as a byte array.

The two parameters (address offset and number of bytes) must be sent with every data transfer.

1st byte address offset high 2nd byte address offset low 3rd byte number of bytes high 4th byte number of bates low 5th byte user data 1st byte 6th byte "2nd byte 7. "...

In the fieldbus output data, the data is sent to the PLC as follows sent: 0x00 0x00 0x01 0x02 0x03 0x04 0x05 0x00 ...

**Attention:** From Universalscript version 1.11.1 on the protocol has changed to a master-slave protocol. Here the 2nd bus side is the master.

The C4Map side only responds when a valid telegram is received. The received telegram can be sent without process data.

Example: the 2nd bus side sends to the C4Map side: 0x00 0x00 0x00 0x00 0xFF

The C4Map page always replies with the full length, even if the content of the process data has not changed.

If the 2nd bus side does not receive a valid response within 4 seconds (timeout 4000 ms), the data received up to that point are discarded. An error message is an output as a diagnosis on the debug interface and a new request with the above empty telegram is sent.

If the C4Map side receives an invalid telegram, it is signalled by error 13 on the error LEDs.

# 7.3 The trigger byte

Since the data is always transmitted cyclically with PROFIBUS, the gateway must recognize when the user wants to send new data via the serial interface. This is usually done by the gateway comparing the data transmitted via the Profibus with the internally stored old data - data exchange on change (Data exchange -> On Change). In some cases, however, this cannot be used as a criterion, e.g. if the same data should always be sent. For this reason, the user can set that he wants to control the sending via a trigger byte (Data exchange -> On Trigger). In this mode, the gateway always sends (and only) when the trigger byte is changed.

Accordingly, in normal mode, the application program in the controller cannot recognize whether the gateway has received several identical telegrams. If the trigger byte mode is switched on, the gateway increments the trigger byte each time a telegram is received.

The first byte in the Profibus input / output data buffer is used as the trigger byte when this mode is switched on.

# 7.4 The length byte


It can be configured whether the send length is also stored as a byte in the input / output data area (Fieldbus lengthbyte -> active). As many bytes are sent in the send direction as are specified in this byte. When a telegram is received, the gateway enters the number of characters received.

# 7.5 Swap word


When "Swap word" is activated, the data is exchanged word by word to and from the fieldbus. I.e. High and low bytes in a 16 bit word are exchanged and transferred to the CAN bus. It affects the entire fieldbus buffer.

# 8 Hardware ports, switches and LEDs CANopen (Mapping)

# 8.1 Device labeling

In case the front panel should pop out it does not affect the device's function or quality. It can be put in again without problems.

# 8.2 Connectors

# 8.2.1 Connector to the external device (RS-interface)

The service RS232 interface is available on the plug concealed on the top of the device.

# 8.2.4 Power supply

The device must be powered with 10-33 VDC, The voltage supply is made through the 4-pole screw-plug connector at the device's bottom side.

Please note that the devices of the series UNIGATE® should not be operated with AC voltage.

## 8.3 LEDs

# 8.4.1 Rotary coding switches S4 + S5 (serial interface)

If the Gateway is operated as the first or last physical device in the CANopen<sup>®</sup>, there must be a bus termination at this Gateway. In order to do this, either a bus terminating resistor must be activated in the connector or the resistor (220  $\Omega$ ) integrated in the Gateway must be activated. In order to do this, slide the slide switch to position ON. In all other cases, the slide switch must remain in position OFF. Please refer to the general Fieldbus literature for further information on the subject of bus termination.



#### 8.4.3 DIP-Switch

The DIP-switch is used to set the Node-ID and Baud rate according to picture 3.

If the Node-ID 0 (which is not allowed in CANopen®) is set on the DIP-Switch, then the Node-ID, which is stored in the EEROM via the Script or WINGATE is used in this case. That way it is also possible to set Node-IDs > 63 and there is no unclarity if the Node-ID of the DIP-Switch or the Node-ID of the Script is valid.

In the initial state the Node-ID 1 is stored in the EEROM.




Picture 1: DIP-Switch



# 11 Installation guidelines

#### 11.1 Installation of the module

The module with the dimensions 23 x 117 x 111 mm resp. 23 x 117 x 117 mm with Option I/O8 (W x D x H) has been developed for switch cabinet use (IP 20) and can thus be mounted only on a standard mounting channel (deep DIN-rail to EN 50022).

#### 11.1.1 Mounting

- Engage the module from the top in the top-hat rail and swivel it down so that the module engages in position.
- Other modules may be rowed up to the left and right of the module.
- There must be at least 5 cm clearance for heat dissipation above and below the module.
- The standard mounting channel must be connected to the equipotential bonding strip of the switch cabinet. The connection wire must feature a cross-section of at least 10 mm<sup>2</sup>.

#### 11.1.2 Removal

- First disconnect the power supply and signal lines.
- Then push the module up and swivel it out of the top-hat rail.

#### Vertical installation

The standard mounting channel may also be mounted vertically so that the module is mounted turned through 90°.

# 11.2 Wiring

# 11.2.1 Connection systems - PROFIBUS

The following connection systems must resp. may be used when wiring the module:

- Standard screw-type/plug connection (power supply + Debug)
- 9-pin D-SUB plug connector (PROFIBUS DP)
- a) In the case of standard screw-type terminals, one lead can be clamped per connection point. It is best to then use a screwdriver with a blade width of 3.5 mm to firmly tighten the screw.

Permitted cross-sections of the line:

Flexible line with wire-end ferrule: 1 x 0.25 ... 1.5 mm²
 Solid conductor: 1 x 0.25 ... 1.5 mm²
 Tightening torque: 0.5 ... 0.8 Nm

- b) The plug-in connection terminal strip is a combination of standard screw-type terminal and plug connector. The plug connection section is coded and can thus not be plugged on the wrong way round.
- c) The 9-pin D-SUB plug connector is secured with two screws with "4-40-UNC" thread. It is best to use a screwdriver with a blade width of 3.5 mm to screw the screw tight.

Tightening torque: 0.2... 0.4 Nm

# 11.2.2 Connection systems - CANopen

The following connection systems must resp. may be used when wiring the module:

Standard screw-type/plug connection (power supply + Debug)

- 9-pin D-SUB plug connector (CANopen®)
- a) In the case of standard screw-type terminals, one lead can be clamped per connection point. It is best to then use a screwdriver with a blade width of 3.5 mm to firmly tighten the screw.

Permitted cross-sections of the line:

Flexible line with wire-end ferrule: 1 x 0.25 ... 1.5 mm²
 Solid conductor: 1 x 0.25 ... 1.5 mm²
 Tightening torque: 0.5 ... 0.8 Nm

#### 11.2.2.1 Power supply

The device must be powered with 10..33 V DC.

• Connect the supply voltage to the 4-pole plug-in screw terminal in accordance with the labelling on the device.

# 11.2.2.2 Equipotential bonding connection

The connection to the potential equalization automatically takes place it is put on the DIN-rail.

## 12 CANopen® communication interface

## 12.1 Bus line with copper cable

This interface is located on the module in the form of a 9-pin D-SUB plug on the front side of the housing.

- Plug the CANopen® connector onto the SUB-D plug labelled "CANopen®".
- Firmly screw the securing screws of the plug connector tight using a screwdriver.
- If the module is located at the start or end of the CANopen<sup>®</sup> line, you must connect the bus terminating resistor integrated in the gateway. In order to do this, slide the slide switch to the position labeled ...on...
  - If the module is not located at the start or at the end, you must set the slide switch to position "off".

## 12.2 Line routing, shield and measures to combat interference voltage

This chapter deals with line routing in the case of bus, signal and power supply lines, with the aim of ensuring an EMC-compliant design of your system.

## 12.3 General information on line routing

Inside and outside of cabinets

In order to achieve EMC-compliant routing of the lines, it is advisable to split the lines into the following line groups and to lay these groups separately.

- ⇒ Group A: shielded bus and data lines (e. g. for PROFIBUS DP, RS232C and printers etc.)
  - shielded analogue lines
  - unshielded lines for DC voltages ≥ 60 V
  - unshielded lines for AC voltage ≥ 25 V
  - · coaxial lines for monitors
- ⇒ Group B:
- unshielded lines for DC voltages ≥ 60 V and ≥ 400 V
- unshielded lines for AC voltage  $\geq$  24 V and  $\geq$  400 V
- ⇒ Group C: unshielded lines for DC voltages > 400 V

The table below allows you to read off the conditions for laying the line groups on the basis of the combination of the individual groups.

Table 3: Line laying instructions as a function of the combination of line groups

1) Lines may be laid in common bunches or cable ducts.

- 2) Lines must be laid in separate bunches or cable ducts (without minimum clearance).
- 3) Lines must be laid in separate bunches or cable ducts inside cabinets but on separate cable racks with at least 10 cm clearance outside of cabinets but inside buildings.

### 12.3.1 Shielding of lines

Shielding is intended to weaken (attenuate) magnetic, electrical or electromagnetic interference fields

Interference currents on cable shields are discharged to earth via the shielding bus which is connected conductively to the chassis or housing. A low-impedance connection to the PE wire is particularly important in order to prevent these interference currents themselves becoming an interference source.

Wherever possible, use only lines with braided shield. The coverage density of the shield should exceed 80%. Avoid lines with foil shield since the foil can be damaged very easily as the result of tensile and compressive stress on attachment. The consequence is a reduction in the shielding effect.

In general, you should always connect the shields of cables at both ends. The only way of achieving good interference suppression in the higher frequency band is by connecting the shields at both ends.

The shield may also be connected at one end only in exceptional cases. However, this then achieves only an attenuation of the lower frequencies. Connecting the shield at one end may be more favorable if

- it is not possible to lay an equipotential bonding line
- analogue signals (a few mV resp. mA) are to be transmitted
- · foil shields (static shields) are used.

In the case of data lines for serial couplings, always use metallic or metallized plugs and connectors. Attach the shield of the data line to the plug or connector housing.

If there are potential differences between the earthing points, a compensating current may flow via the shield connected at both ends. In this case, you should lay an additional equipotential bonding line.

Please note the following points when shielding:

- Use metal cable clips to secure the shield braiding. The clips must surround the shield over a large area and must have good contact.
  - Downstream of the entry point of the line into the cabinet, connect the shield to a shielding bus. Continue the shield as far as the module, but do not connect it again at this point!

# 13 CANopen®

## 13.1 Description CANopen®

This specification is based on the CiA<sup>®</sup> Draft Standard 301 (DS301). CANopen<sup>®</sup> supports the Standard CAN-frame with 11-bit Identifier. It is not required to support the extended frame with 29-bit Identifier.

Interference currents on cable shields are discharged to earth via the shielding bus which is connected conductively to the chassis or housing. A low-impedance connection to the PE wire is particularly important in order to prevent these interference currents themselves becoming an interference source.

Wherever possible, use only lines with braided shield. The coverage density of the shield should exceed 80%. Avoid lines with foil shield since the foil can be damaged very easily as the result of tensile and compressive stress on attachment. The consequence is a reduction in the shielding effect

In general, you should always connect the shields of cables at both ends. The only way of achieving good interference suppression in the higher frequency band is by connecting the shields at both ends.

The shield may also be connected at one end only in exceptional cases. However, this then achieves only an attenuation of the lower frequencies. Connecting the shield at one end may be more favorable if

- it is not possible to lay an equipotential bonding line
- analogue signals (a few mV resp. mA) are to be transmitted
- foil shields (static shields) are used.

In the case of data lines for serial couplings, always use metallic or metallized plugs and connectors. Attach the shield of the data line to the plug or connector housing.

If there are potential differences between the earthing points, a compensating current may flow via the shield connected at both ends. In this case, you should lay an additional equipotential bonding line.

Please note the following points when shielding:

- Use metal cable clips to secure the shield braiding. The clips must surround the shield over a large area and must have good contact.
- Downstream of the entry point of the line into the cabinet, connect the shield to a shielding bus. Continue the shield as far as the module, but do not connect it again at this point!

## 14.4 Description of the DPV1-/DPV2-functions

#### 14.4.1 DPV1

Die DPV1-Erweiterung besteht aus folgenden Funktionen:

1. Acyclic data exchange with Class1-Master (e. g.: PLC)

This function is optional for a DPV1-Slave. Our gateways support this function as a default. By means of this function the Class1-Master can read and write data from the slave acyclically. This data is processed by the script in the gateway. The channel for the acyclic data exchange is set up firmly during the parameterization.

#### 2. Acyclic data exchange with Class2-Master (e. g.: control unit)

This option is optional for a DPV1-Slave as well. Our gateways support this function as a default. By means of this function the Class2-Master can read and write data from the slave acyclically. This data is processed by the script in the gateway. The channel for the acyclic data exchange is set up prior to every data exchange and closed again afterwards.

#### 3. Alarm handling

Aso the alarms are optional. If they are activated, they replace the device-specific diagnosis. At present our gateway does not support alarms.

Every DPV1-Slave must support the extended parameterization since it is determined in Octet 8 of the parameterization telegram whether it is a DPV0- or a DPV1-Slave.

A DPV1-Slave can also be operated at a DPV0-Master if the DPV1-functions remain turned off.

#### 14.4.2 DPV2

Die DPV2-enlargement consists of the following functions:

#### 1. Isochron Mode (IsoM)

It means the clock-synchronous behavior of a bus system. This function is optional for a DPV2-Slave and is activated via the GSD-file. At present our gateway does not support this mode.

#### 2. Data Exchange Broadcast (DxB)

It means the communication between Slaves (inter-communication). This function is optional for a DPV2-Slave and is activated via the GSD-file. At present our gateway only supports the function of the "Publisher" (sending data to other Slaves). The function "Susbcriber" (receiving data from other Slaves) is not supported at present.

#### 3. Up- And Download

This function is also optional for a DPV2-Slave and at present it is not supported by our gateway.

#### 4. Time-synchronization (Time stamp)

This function is also optional for a DPV2-Slave and at present it is not supported by our gateway.

#### 5. Redundancy concept

This function is also optional for a DPV2-Slave and at present it is not supported by our gateway.

### 14.5 Representation of the data in PROFIBUS DP

Any standard-compliant PROFIBUS DP Master can exchange data with the gateway. It is also possible to use very "simple" Master connections owing to the data structure.

### 14.5.1 Configuration telegram


After programming, the Master must send a configuration telegram to the corresponding Slave. The configuration telegram provides the Slave with information on the length of the input/output data. If the user has set the 'Length byte' flag, this means the maximum data lengths. Otherwise, it means the actual lengths.

The user normally also configures the configuration telegram in the project planning tool where he may also, if necessary, enter the address range in which the useful data is stored.


You can write up to 16 bytes or words in one octet of the DataUnit (DU). Inputs and outputs having the same format can be combined in one octet. Otherwise, you must use as many octets as the number of different bytes/words you wish to use and which cannot be combined in one octet.

If the module detects, during the check, that the maximum permitted input/output data lengths have been exceeded, it signals incorrect configuration to the Master during a subsequent diagnostic scan. It is then not ready for useful data communication.

Structure of an octet in the configuration telegram:




## 14.5.3 Diagnosis


Diagnostic data is high-priority data. The gateway runs an external diagnostic if it detects an internal error.


Representation of the information in the external diagnostic byte:

The diagnostic information of a DP Slave consists of standard diagnostic information items (6 bytes) and a user-specific diagnostic information item. (Error number)

#### 14.5.3.1 Diagnosis in DPV1

The "external diagnosis" of DPV0 (old PB) is used differently at DPV1. At DPV1 the alarms and the status messages are transfered there. Since the gateway's error numbers have been transfered in the external diagnosis it became necessary then to carry out an adaptation at DPV1. Now the 3 bytes "0x81, 0x00, 0x00" have been inserted in front of the actual error message in order to be compatible with DPV1-masters. With it a DPV1-master identifies our gateway's error as status message now.

This results in a different representation of our gateway error in PROFIBUS. At DPV0 the error number is transmitted in unmodified form as 1 byte external diagnosis. In case DPV1 has been activated in the gateway through the GSD-file, the error number occurs as 1 byte status message.

Supposing the DPV1 is activated and a master (which does not support the alarms and status messages) is connected, then our gateway error number is presented as "external diagnosis" with 4 bytes (see above), at which point the 4th byte contains the error number and the preceding 3 bytes (0x81, 0x00, 0x00) can be ignored.

## 14.5.4 Data exchange

After the Master, in the diagnostic, detects that the Slave is ready for data exchange, it sends data exchange telegrams. Either the Master stores the data in the input/output direction in the address area specified during project planning or the control program must fetch or retrieve the data using specific function blocks.

## 16.2 Components


You will require the following components to commission the UNIGATE®:

- UNIGATE<sup>®</sup>
- Connection cable from gateway to the process
- Connector for Profibus connection to the Gateway
- PROFIBUS cable (this cable is generally already installed on site!)
- 10..33 V DC power supply (DIN 19240)
- Type file or GSD file and user manual (a sample file as well as the user manual can be ordered separately or downloaded free of charge from our homepage at www.deutschmann.de).

#### 16.3 Installation

The UNIGATE® CX-C4Map-PB module features protection type IP20 and is thus suitable for switch cabinet use. The device is designed for snapping onto a 35 mm DIN-rail..

## 16.5 Commissioning

It is essential that you perform the following steps during commissioning in order to ensure that the module operates correctly:

## 16.6 Setting the CANopen® address and baud rate

Set the CANopen<sup>®</sup>-Node-ID and the baud rate at the fieldbus end of the module on the DIP-switch (see also chapter 26.4.3).



#### Attention:

The CANopen® address set must correspond to the planned address! All users in the CANopen® have to use the same Baud rate! These values are read in only on power-up of the gateway!

## 16.6.1 CANopen® connection

Connect the device to the CANopen® at the interface labelled "CANopen®".

## 16.6.2 Connection to the process device

Please also read the manual for the process device when commissioning the process device.

#### 16.6.3 Connecting the supply voltage

Please connect 10..33 DC voltage to the terminals provided for this.

#### 16.6.4 Shield connection

Earth the top-hat rail onto which the module has been snapped.

#### 16.6.5 Project planning

Use any project planning tool for project planning.

### 16.7 Setting the PROFIBUS address

Set the PROFIBUS address at the fieldbus end of the module on the two rotary switches designated "PROFIBUS-ID High" and "PROFIBUS-ID Low" This adjustment is carried out in a hexadecimal way.


Example:

The PROFIBUS-ID is 26 decimal = 1A hexadecimal

The switch "PROFIBUS-ID High" has to be set to 1 and the switch "PROFIBUS-ID Low has to be set to A.

If the rotary switch is set to "7E" (=126) on the PROFIBUS-side (PROFIBUS-ID), the gateway operates with a PROFIBUS-address, that is stored in the EEROM. In the state of delivery this address is set to 126 and can only be changed by a PROFIBUS-master via the PROFIBUS itself. The address 126 is reserved in the PROFIBUS for this purpose; that means that a slave with this address can never carry out a data exchange, but it can only be configured with a new ID.

In case the rotary switch is set to a value between 0...125, the gateway operates - with this PRO-FIBUS-ID and a change via the master is not possible.



#### Attention:

The PROFIBUS address set must correspond to the planned address! It is read in only on power-up of the gateway!

#### 16.7.1 PROFIBUS connection

Connect the device to the PROFIBUS at the interface labelled "PROFIBUS".

Please also read the manual for the process device when commissioning the process device.

## 16.7.3 Connecting the supply voltage

Please connect 10..33 DC voltage to the terminals provided for this.
